Eugene L. DiOrio Retires from Graystone Society Board of Directors



Eugene L. DiOrio may be known to many as an authority on the history of the Lukens Steel Company and the City of Coatesville, but that is not all there is to the man. He is also an author, talented photographer, avid traveler, and a collector of many things, including political and musical autographs. Most importantly he has been a mover and shaker in the world of historic preservation in Coatesville,

Chester County, and Pennsylvania.

Gene was working in the accounting department at Lukens Steel when he met Stewart Huston, and a friendship developed through their mutual interest in history

and opera. Stewart invited Gene to become involved with the Primitive Hall Foundation as accountant, and after Stewart's passing, he served for many years as a foundation Board Member, President & Treasurer, and worked for the further restoration of the historic hall.

In 1984 Gene, along with Mary Sullivan, founded the Graystone Society in order to restore and preserve Graystone Mansion. Eventually the Society acquired both Graystone Mansion and the Huston family home, Terracina, and Gene was a catalyst for the creation of the Lukens National Historic District.

Some of Gene's other endeavors include service on the Chester County Parks & Recreation Board, Brandywine Battlefield Park Commission, Preservation Pennsylvania Board, and the Pennsylvania Capitol Preservation Committee in Harrisburg.

There is not enough room here to list all of Gene's accomplishments, but after decades of service to the Graystone Society and the City of Coatesville Gene has decided to retire. However, he will remain in Coatesville and will be serving the Graystone Society on an advisory, emeritus basis, and will continue efforts for recognition of Coatesville and Lukens Steel Co. history and the development of the National Iron and Steel Heritage Museum.

- 684,520 Digital Visitor hits so far (over one million in 2010 due to return of World Trade Center Trees)
- An average of 2,500 unique visitors to our website every month
- 1,860 views of our videos on C3TV so far this year
- A list of 2,600 contacts, which we would like to increase to 3,500 next year.
- 1,117 Email addresses

The Mariners' Museum

The first battle between ironclad vessels took place on March 9, 1862 between the USS Monitor and the Confederate Virginia (USS Merrimack), a battle that changed naval warfare forever.



The Monitor sank in 1862 and the wreck wasn't discovered until 1973, at which point the site became the first National Marine Sanctuary.

The Mariners' Museum in Newport News, Virginia is the home of artifacts from the Monitor, which they are working to conserve after almost 140 years of immersion in saltwater.

Visitors to the museum can view the Monitor's revolving gun turret, steam engine, screw propeller and other artifacts. Many of these articles are displayed within huge tanks containing treatment solution, with ongoing conservation work being done.

The Mariners' Museum is more than just the USS Monitor, it has a wealth of permanent and traveling exhibitions concerning naval history, plus educational programs. The collections contain photographs, ship models, art and thousands of other objects having to do with the sea.

Union Monitor 1861-65

By Angus Konstam, Illustrated by Tony Bryan

This easy-to-read book is devoted to the history of the earliest American iron-clad warships the Monitors. It is full of information on the development of all Monitor style ships, not just the first well-known Monitor that fought at Hampton Roads.

Following this battle more of these vessels were built, until a squadron protected the

squadron protected the ships blockading the Southern coastline. By the end of the war the US Navy possessed a modern coastal fleet carrying the most powerful artillery afloat.

Union Monitor 1861-65 contains rare archival photos, period engravings, cut-a-way drawings of the interior workings, and specially commissioned paintings.
